As of September 4, 2018, the District had 11,767 students enrolled in grades kindergarten through eighth grade. There are an additional 165 students enrolled in special education preschool classes at Conyers Learning Academy (CLA) as well as 384 students enrolled in preschool classrooms in the District who are served by the Early Childhood Developmental Enrichment Center (ECDEC). With the addition of 549 preschool students, this brings the total student enrollment in preschool through eighth grade in the District to 12,316 students.

Enrollment will likely fluctuate from this point in time until the District submits enrollment data at the end of September to the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to fulfill an annual yearly requirement (known as the Fall Housing Report) along with all of the public school districts in the state.

A ten-year review of fall housing data for the district is located below. For the purposes of comparison, the enrollment data as of September 4, 2018, for the current school year is included in grayscale.

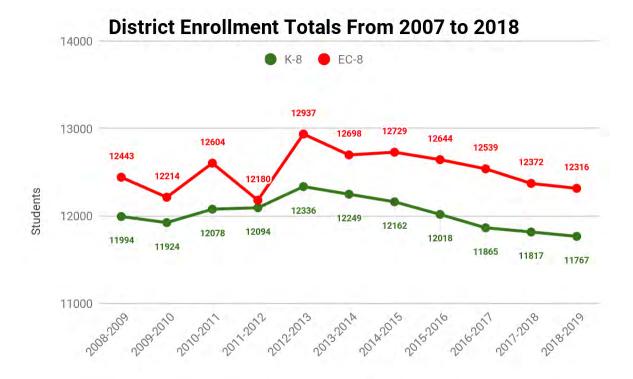

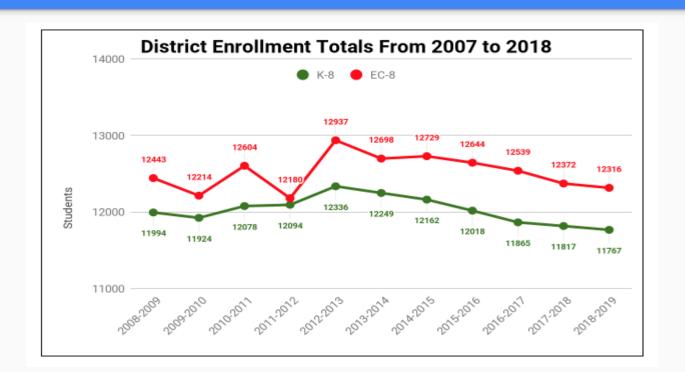

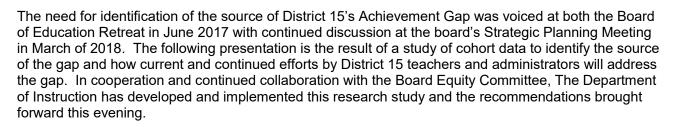

RE: Achievement Gap Presentation



The Department of Instruction conducted the research study using student cohort data comprised of students who attended District 15, consistently from second grade through eighth grade. We examined the district's impact on students as opposed to singling out specific groups typically associated with achievement gaps. Our gap is defined as students who started in second grade with academic performance on MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) below the 25th percentile and never advanced beyond the 25th percentile by the time they finished eighth grade.

This group of students was not found to have any of the identifying factors typically associated with the achievement gap. The student group cannot be attributed to native language, school of attendance, or race/ethnicity. The consistent factor among students who began below the 25th percentile and never advance beyond in their academic career through eighth grade do have some factors in common: a lack of oral language proficiency (which can occur even when the student only speaks English); and or long term English Language Learner status; and or poverty status.

When considering these factors, there are a variety of interventions already occurring consistently in our district, interventions being piloted, and still others which are currently being researched. These interventions include:

- Implementation of Culturally and Linguistically Responsive Teaching (CLR)
- Adoption of new curriculum materials in English and Spanish
- Implementation of an Instructional coaching model to address ELA, Math and Social-Emotional Learning.
- Implementation of the Word Generation program district wide.
- Implementation of professional development for teachers increasing their expertise in Language Development.

The Department of Instruction sincerely appreciates the support provided by the full board, and especially the Equity Committee. Continued updates will occur to the Equity Committee and Board of Education regularly throughout the school year.

Our Achievement Gap Definition:

Students who are in the lowest achieving 25% in 2nd Grade nationally on the English Measures of Academic Progress and stay in this group when they leave us in 8th grade.

- Non-traditional way of looking at achievement gap
- Examined <u>how 'we' impact students as a district</u> rather than making assumptions about specific groups of students
- Our study included a nine year span of student data who were in
 D15 <u>their entire academic career</u>





What we now know...

These factors *do not* contribute to our gap:

- Native Language
- School of Attendance
- Race/Ethnicity





Factors in our Gap: Oral Language Proficiency (OLP)

- What is Oral Language Proficiency (OLP)?
- Limited OLP is associated with low academic growth.
- This is true regardless of the student's language background.





Additional Factors

- Long term English Learner (EL) students tend to start and remain at the lowest 25th percent of student achievement throughout their care.
- Students of poverty tend to remain at the lowest 25th percent of student achievement.





Guaranteed and Viable Curriculum

One of the most powerful things a school can do to help enhance student achievement is to guarantee that specific content is taught in specific courses and grade levels. It is important to note the two parts in the concept of a guaranteed and viable curriculum: The fact that it is guaranteed assures us that specific content is taught in specific courses and at specific grade levels, regardless of the teacher to whom a student is assigned. The fact that it is viable indicates that there is enough instructional time available to actually teach the content identified as important



(Marzano, Leaders of Learning 2011).

Determining a School Focus

- Examined different assessments

Reading

Our Learner-Centered Priority

- We examined Fountas & Pinnell comprehension data
- As a staff, we noticed that students had difficulty answering comprehension questions regarding the text that went beyond literal information (inferential)
- We developed the following statement to describe what we noticed:
- At TJ, the learner-centered problem is that students have trouble answering beyond the text comprehension questions.

Our Instructional Priority

- What can we strengthen or modify to influence our learner-centered problem?
- Examined instruction
 - Walk-throughs
 - Laser focus on particular behaviors
 - Look Fors

Our Instructional Priority (continued)

- We used various protocols with our staff to analyze and interpret the data
 - Quantitative and Qualitative
 - Our SIP team reviewed the staff's analysis and identified the following problem of practice:
 - As teachers we do not provide consistent opportunities for students to practice responding to higher level questions independently.

Critical Next Steps

- Finalize and implement a plan to address the problem of practice
- A five step action plan for the 2018-2019 school year.
 - Common understanding and terminology
 - Exemplars
 - Time for teachers to reflect and make adjustments to their instruction



Determining a School Focus

 The school staff reviewed school-wide test results for the past several years through the data dashboard. We realized that as a school there is much to celebrate in student achievement but from a growth perspective there are opportunities for improvement.

 We compared how each part of our student body performed in reading and math. This included looking at grade levels, MAP, PARCC, second language students, students with IEP's and by ethnicity.

 We concluded that increased growth in Reading for all students was our priority.

Our Learner-Centered Priority

 We worked with Dr. Edgar and Mr. Carmody to develop a protocol to go through with the staff to develop of LCP.

Student performance on our reading curriculum tests was reviewed.

 Based upon this analysis, we concluded that our students' most important priority is that students were having difficulty making logical inferences based on text evidence.

Our Instructional Priority

• The administration collected data on the school's teaching practices (look-fors) through a walkthrough process. Anonymous data was collected during this process that spanned 22 classrooms over a 4 week period.

- The SIP team examined the data collected and concluded that, as a staff, we need to provide students with the skills necessary to provide higher level logical questioning when making inferences to their teachers.
- As teachers we found that the need to provide higher level questions to students when analyzing text with students was a priority.

Our School's Action Plan

 Once we identified what about our instruction could be enhanced or changed, teachers have begun to focus on the look-for's especially higher level questioning strategies.

 Provide professional development and time for teachers to develop the skills necessary to provide higher level questioning to students.

 Begin the process to allow teachers on a voluntary basis to view other teachers instructing literacy. Our SIP team has begun to welcome this idea.

Critical Next Steps

- Continue to use student assessments to look at student performance.
- Continue to gather data through our walk-throughs and analyze the data.
- Continue to refine our collaborative days and determine the impact of the days and how they impact student performance.
- To provide feedback on higher level questioning in the classroom and providing the professional development needed.

PUBLIC HEARING ON THE ADOPTION OF THE FY2019 TENTATIVE BUDGET

Call to Order

Board President Szczupaj announced that the public hearing on the Adoption of the FY2019 Tentative Budget was now open. The hearing opened at 7:06 p.m.

Report

The Board of Education held a public hearing related to the tentative fiscal year 2019 budget. Mr. Adamczyk reviewed the proposed 2018-19 budget, which was first presented at the Board's June 6, 2018, Board of Education meeting.

Mr. Adamczyk noted that no changes have been made to the budget at this time and that because of the state's new Evidence-Based Funding Model, an additional \$394,636.85 in revenue would be added to this year's budget, bringing the total state contribution to \$16.515 million. Additionally, the Business Office and the Human Resources Department are finalizing the budget allocation for the Program Assistants and continue to onboard certified staff. These adjustments will be presented to the board at the September 12, 2018, Board of Education meeting, prior to a vote on its formal adoption. The entire tentative budget presentation can be viewed online, through the district's website.

Public Comment

Report

The Board of Education held a public hearing related to an Interfund Transfer Resolution. Annually the District transfers funds between \$1.5 million and \$3.5 million from the Operations and Maintenance Fund to the Capital Projects Fund. This year the district needed to transfer \$4.5 million from the Education Fund to the Operations and Maintenance Fund. The transfer from Operations and Maintenance Fund to the Capital Project Fund in the 2018–19 school year would be \$8,250,000. The School Code requires the Board to hold a public hearing authorizing an interfund transfer from the Education Fund prior to the Board action formally authorizing the transfer. A resolution was passed at the June 6, 2018, Board of Education meeting setting the hearing date.

Administration recommends the Board adoption of the resolution which formally approves the transfer of \$4.5 million from the Education Fund to the Operations and Maintenance Fund.

The Interfund Transfer Resolution was considered and voted upon later in the meeting.

RECOGNITION—D15 PHYSICAL EDUCATION STAFF BY AMERICAN HEART ASSOCIATION

Emilie Molidor, representative of the American Heart Association (AHA), recognized our District 15 physical education staff members for their efforts in fundraising over \$61,000 for the charitable organization. The amount of money raised was the equivalent of 1,226 lives saved, according to AHA. The money goes to research, public awareness, and more. The most popular form of fundraising for AHA in District 15 schools is the Jump Rope for Heart program.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

• Recognition of Ralph Hettich

The Board congratulated Walter R. Sundling Junior High School night custodian, Ralph Hettich, on his retirement, after 44 years of service to District 15. Ralph was recognized for his efforts in setting up the board room for each meeting during his tenure at Walter R. Sundling Junior High. To further recognize Ralph's contributions to the school, Principal Jason Dietz dedicated a hallway after Ralph, calling it, "Hettich Hallway."

• School Improvement Plan Presentations

Dr. Thompson noted that the Board heard reports from each school last school year, giving members an idea of the uniqueness of each school and a glimpse into some of the programs occurring in these schools that would not typically be seen during a brief visit. Dr. Thompson stated that this school year, each school principal will be

making a presentation about their school's improvement plan (SIP). The principals will highlight the data analysis that the staffs undertook, and the corresponding action items to improve that data.

Thomas Edgar, Ph.D., executive director, assessment, accountability, and programs, shared a presentation on the structure of the SIP that each school is expected to employ, and what board members can anticipate hearing from each principal at future meetings. The school improvement presentation can be viewed online, through the district's website. Dr. Edgar then responded to inquiries from the board.

• First Day of School Update

Dr. Thompson provided an update on the first day of school across the district. He noted that things ran smoothly and it was a great start to the new school year. Administrators were on hand at the schools to welcome both students and staff. There were very few issues throughout the day, even the rain held off until after students were dismissed.

• Summer 2018 Construction Update

Mr. Adamczyk and Craig Phillips, manager, environmental services, provided an overview of the construction work accomplished Summer 2018 within the District. Among the multitude of projects completed there were:

- Frank C. Whiteley Elementary School curtain walls (outside) with brightly colored façade
- o Plum Grove Junior High School curtain walls (outside) with sophisticated finishes, ventilation system
- o Pleasant Hill Elementary School carpeting
- o Winston Campus Junior High School front office renovations
- o Conyers Learning Academy paving/parking spaces
- Walter R. Sundling Junior High School, Carl Sandburg Elementary School, and Winston Campus –
 Science Technology Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Lab updates/realignment
- Carl Sandburg Elementary School and Thomas Jefferson Elementary School updated special education rooms

Mr. Adamczyk and Dr. Thompson thanked both the superb in-house staff and construction crew for their tireless efforts to ready the buildings for the start of school.

• Full Day Kindergarten Building Update

Staying within the timeframe for the due diligence period, the district is hoping to file a special usage request submission to the Village of Palatine regarding the Park Place property acquisition/usage. The board approved a purchase agreement for Park Place Shopping Center store front property at the June 6, 2018, Board of Education meeting. Dr. Thompson stated that the district was in the process of finalizing documents to go to the village's zoning board to present our case and then possibly move to the village council for final consideration. If the village approves the proposed special use, the school board could potentially start to consider the options of either renovating some of its schools to accommodate more students for full-day kindergarten, or take over the Park Place space to house a future early childhood or full elementary school, as early as October 1, 2018.

• Boundaries Update

Dr. Thompson noted that the District's overall enrollment has decreased by about 500 students over the last five years. However, there are four schools were the trend is just the opposite: Pleasant Hill, Hunting Ridge, and Willow Bend Elementary Schools and Plum Grove Junior High School, have all seen significant increases. He noted that Dr. Barbini would be presenting a student enrollment update at the September 12, 2018, Board of Education meeting outlining these burgeoning areas and what solutions are being implemented to address these areas of concern. Further, the boundary consultant company has been provided with all the data they need to provide us with up to five possible solutions for redrawing the boundaries for the Board to consider. Additionally, an invitation would be going out in the next few weeks to invite people to participate in a Boundary Committee. The consultants are supplying the district with software by which one can go in and actually manipulate boundaries and class sizes to view the possible outcomes for both particular schools and their neighbors. The committee could provide direction, workers, and possibly as many as three options in addition to those of the consultant company for the Board to consider going forward. Ideally, the committee would consist of various stake holders and representatives from as many different sectors of the community as possible, and meet the end of September 2018. Boundary software is expected to go live late October to November 2018.

• Infinite Campus Rollout

Dr. Thompson provided an update on the Infinite Campus rollout. He noted that as with any software conversion, there are always some difficulties with a data base the size of the district. While the rollover had been considered for mid-year, it has since been reconsidered to be publicly debuted for the start of the 2019–20 school year. It gives all parties involved time to prepare and update current information to be the most accurate as possible. This would also enable staff to receive training, practice in smaller areas (i.e. junior high scheduling) throughout the year, make updates behind the scenes, and ultimately roll out Fall 2019 for all parents and staff to use.

• Superintendent Search Update

Dr. Thompson noted that BWP and Associates, the executive search firm for the superintendent search, are accepting applications at this point for the board to consider down the road. A draft schedule of potential dates to interview candidates was provided. After some discussion, it was the consensus of the board to meet on Saturday, December 8, 2018, for final interviews.

ED-RED COUNCIL/LEGISLATION

Mr. Annerino reported that the establishment of a Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Reform Task Force, as part of the new Evidence-Based Funding formula, recently released its report. The Task Force was charged with reviewing the benefits and costs of TIF districts, the interaction between TIF law and school funding, the expenditure of TIF funds, and the expenditure of TIF surplus funds. The Task Force held meetings in which representatives from local governments, education, private industry, nonprofit entities, and the economic development community provided testimony. Two recommendations resulting from the submitted report included: joint review board to approve TIFs, and weighted voting based upon the tax district's percentage of total property tax raised. Additionally, he noted that if there are students added due to a TIF area being redeveloped, there would be funding consideration given to the receiving district.

Separately, Mr. Annerino noted the Supreme Court ruling with regard to employees having to pay union dues. Basically, it was found to be unconstitutional to make employees pay fair share fees, this must be a voluntary withdrawal from their paychecks. Going forward the district would receive a list from the unions of those employees requesting dues to be withdrawn.

Mrs. Kain noted there was nothing to report at this time.

Mrs. Delack addressed the success of the district's new mobile application that debuted recently. Families have embraced the latest student information technology available to them and it has been impressively widely used in its brief existence to this point. While there have been a few hiccups, she noted there had been over 10,000 views on the app to date.

Additionally, a new automated phone system was put into place at the schools, calling families when a student absence occurs, making it a highly effective tool for schools to assure their students' safety.

Dr. Thompson also noted that the District 15 Website Redesign was selected as a winner of the 2018 Illinois Chapter of the National School Public Relation Association's Communications Contest. He congratulated Mrs. Delack, Sandy Cramer, web and print specialist, and June Becker, senior executive assistant, for their work achieving this goal.

Alliance Legislative Report 100-74

ACTION TAKEN ON EDUCATION BILLS

Governor Bruce Rauner has been taking action on various pieces of legislation that have reached his desk since the legislative session concluded. After a bill is approved by the legislature, the General Assembly has 30 days to send the bill to the governor. The governor then has 60 days to either sign or veto a bill. While Governor Bruce Rauner has acted on many pieces of legislation, he has yet to take action on several issues including the minimum teacher salary bill (SB 2892, Manar D-Bunker Hill). BILLS THAT HAVE BEEN SIGNED INTO LAW

<u>HB 751</u> (Davidsmeyer, R-Jacksonville) extends the sunset provision for retired teachers returning to teaching in subject shortage areas from June 30, 2013 to June 30, 2019. Public Act 100-0743; effective August 10, 2018.

<u>HB 3784</u> (Sosnowski, R-Rockford) removes the ability of a school district to deny enrollment for 17 year old students for failure to meet minimum academic standards and provides that no child may be denied re-enrollment under sections referring to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). Public Act 100-0825; effective August 13, 2018.

<u>HB 4193</u> (Parkhurst, R-Kankakee), for special education impartial due process hearings, changes when the hearing officer must issue his or her written decision from within 10 days to within 10 business days after the hearing. Public Act 100-0849; effective August 14, 2018.

<u>HB 4226</u> (Kifowit, D-Aurora) requires schools to disseminate a brochure to any family whose child may have sustained a concussion and requires the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to adopt rules for accommodations for concussed students. Public Act 100-0747; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>HB 4340</u> (Wheeler, R-Crystal Lake) requires school administrators to post notice of the human trafficking hotline in the administrative office, or another location, in view of school employees. Public Act 100-0671; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>HB 4346</u> (Jones, D-Chicago) requires each public university to offer a course studying the events of Black History, and allows school districts and public universities to meet certain requirements by offering an online course. Public Act 100-0634; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>HB 4369</u> (Sommer, R-Morton) requires ISBE to develop and maintain a dyslexia handbook, make it available on their website, and update it every four years. Public Act 100-0617; effective July 20, 2018.

<u>HB 4409</u> (**Pritchard**, **R-Sycamore**) changes part of the definition of school psychologist to a person that holds a valid Nationally Certified School Psychologist (NCSP) credential. Public Act 100-0750; effective August 10, 2018.

<u>HB 4706</u> (Scherer, D-Decatur) makes permissive the current requirement for substitute teachers to be physically fit. It requires the hiring school board to pay for the examination when

it requires an examination of any substitute teacher. Public Act 100-0855; effective August 14, 2018.

<u>HB 4742</u> (Ford, D-Chicago) allows school districts to supplement their substitute teacher recruitment with the use of recruiting firms. Public Act 100-0813; effective August 13, 2018.

<u>HB 4870</u> (Lang, D-Chicago) requires school districts to authorize a parent or guardian of a student, who is a qualifying patient, to administer a medical cannabis infused product to the student on school premises or a school bus if both the student and the parent or guardian have been issued registry identification cards. Public Act 100-0660; effective August 1, 2018.

<u>HB 4908</u> (Moeller, D-Elgin) requires all children entering kindergarten, second, sixth and ninth grades to have a dental examination. Public Act 100-0829; effective January 1, 2019.

HB 5136 (Slaughter, D-Chicago) provides that the Performance Evaluation Review Act (PERA) committee meet annually, and also includes language exempting the Reduction In Force and PERA committees from the Open Meetings Act (OMA). It also allows collective bargaining strategy sessions to be exempt from the provisions of the OMA. Public Act 100-0768; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>HB 5137</u> (Martwick, D-Chicago) requires the Teachers' Retirement System (TRS) to offer an optional defined contribution retirement plan for members to join. Public Act 100-0769; effective August 10, 2018.

<u>HB 5148</u> (**Kifowit**) requires that course material and instruction in sex education shall include emphasis on what constitutes sexual consent, harassment and assault in the workplace and on a college campus. Public Act 100-0684; effective August 3, 2018.

<u>HB 5196</u> (Greenwood, D-East St. Louis) lowers the licensure renewal fee for paraprofessionals beginning July 1, 2018, from \$50 to \$25. Public Act 100-0772; effective August 10, 2018.

HB 5627 (Bennett, R-Pontiac) would:

- For a two-year period, allow a retired teacher to teach in a school district for up to 120 days (currently 100 days).
- Allow for the establishment of a short-term substitute teaching license for applicants who
 hold an associate's degree or have completed at least 60 hours of credit from a regionally
 accredited institution of higher education.
- Allow school boards, in collaboration with the teachers' union, to jointly develop a short-term substitute teacher training program that provides individuals with short-term substitute teaching license information on curriculum, classroom management techniques, school safety, and district building operations.
- Allow for licensure reciprocity for individuals holding a comparable and valid educator license or certificate from another state. Public Act 100-0596; effective July 1, 2018.

<u>HB 5771</u> (Chapa LaVia, D-Aurora) facilitating the work of the Balanced Accountability Model, establishes a definition of chronic absenteeism and requires state funded early childhood programs to collect and review the data and determine needed resources to engage chronically absent students and their families. Public Act 100-0819; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>SB 486</u> (Harmon, D-Oak Park) makes changes to how the assessment and taxation of solar energy systems are calculated. Public Act 100-0781; effective August 10, 2018.

- <u>SB 650</u> (Connelly, R-Naperville) provides that certain notices concerning requests for mandate waivers may be made electronically. Public Act 100-0782; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 1829</u> (Hutchinson, D-Chicago Heights) makes changes to licensing required to teach preschool children. Public Act 100-0645; effective July 27, 2018.
- SB 2482 (Morrison, D-Deerfield) requires a school bus to be operated with the "SCHOOL BUS" signs covered and the stop signal arm and flashing signal system disabled whenever a school bus is operated for the purpose of transporting passengers over 18 years of age and not school related. Public Act 100-0791; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 2527</u> (Weaver, R-Peoria) p rovides that a school board shall not adopt a policy limiting the number of dual credit courses a student may enroll in, or the number of academic credits a student may receive from dual credit courses. Public Act 100-0792; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 2866</u> (Holmes, D-Aurora) requires the Department of Public Health to provide all students entering sixth grade and their parents with written information about the availability of an HPV vaccine. Public Act 100-0741; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 2889</u> (Rose, R-Champaign) provides that epinephrine may also be administered with a pre-filled syringe. Public Act 100-0799; effective January 1, 2019.
- SB 2900 (Righter, R-Mattoon) provides that if a school board fills a vacancy due to a lack of candidates for election in a congressional township in the most recent election, then the school board shall submit a question to the voters at the next election as to whether they approve atlarge election of that board position instead of mandatory board representation by a specific area. Public Act 100-0800; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 2941</u> (McGuire, D-Joliet) provides that a school district may participate in the ISBE competency-based, high school graduation requirements pilot program for some or all of its schools. Public Act 100-0599; effective June 29, 2018.
- <u>SB 2954</u> (Aquino, D-Chicago) removes "the full-time equivalent" provision in the Teachers Retirement System (TRS) application to determine if the participant's salary exceeds the Governor's salary. Public Act 100-0624; effective July 20, 2018.
- <u>SB 3236</u> (Manar, D-Bunker Hill) requires that a school report card include the most current data possessed by the ISBE relating to a school district's administrative costs. Public Act 100-0807; effective August 10, 2018.
- <u>SB 3466</u>(Lightford, D-Maywood) requires a school district to make reasonable efforts to provide ongoing professional development on the appropriate and available supportive services for the promotion of student attendance and engagement. Public Act 100-0810; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 3536</u> (Collins, D-Chicago) provides that an institution offering an alternative educator licensure program that partners with a public school district administering a preschool educational program under the preschool grant provision must require a principal to recommend or evaluate candidates in the program. Public Act 100-0822; effective January 1, 2019.
- <u>SB 3604</u> (Cullerton, T., D-Villa Park) creates the Government Severance Pay Act to provide that a school district that enters into a contract or employment agreement, or renewal or renegotiation of an existing contract or employment agreement, that contains a provision for

severance pay with an employee – must include specified provisions in the contract. Public Act 100-0895; effective January 1, 2019.

GOVERNOR VETOES SALARY BILL

Governor Bruce Rauner, on Sunday, vetoed the bill which would set a statewide minimum teacher salary of \$40,000 by the 2022-2023 school year. <u>SB 2892</u> (Manar, D-Bunker Hill) would take effect in the 2019-2020 school year by requiring beginning teacher salaries to be at least \$32,000 per year, then increasing salaries incrementally over four school years. Each year thereafter, the minimum teacher salary would increase yearly by the rate of the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

Lawmakers will take up the bill again in the November veto session when the bill sponsor is certain to file a motion to override the veto.

The Alliance opposed the bill in the spring and urged the governor to veto the measure. The veto of the bill was largely due to the advocacy of school board members and other school leaders contacting the governor to urge a veto based on the new mandated costs to local school districts.

It is estimated that nearly half of the school districts in the state would be affected by such a new salary requirement. Any gains in funding due to the new Evidence-Based Funding Formula would be totally consumed by the new salary mandate in many school districts. Under such a law, the net result could actually hurt classroom teachers as school districts would be forced to reduce the teaching force in order to pay the higher salaries.

P.E. BILL VETOED; LUNCH BILL SIGNED

Two other bills being watched closely by the Alliance also saw gubernatorial action last week. **SB 2572 (Holmes, D-Aurora)** would establish a 150 minute per week standard for Physical Education. The bill would roll back the gains in flexibility for school districts that were put in place last year in the school funding bill provision that allows P.E. to be offered three days per week instead of five days per week. The governor vetoed the bill.

SB 2428 (Stadelman, D-Rockford) would allow students, regardless of ability to pay, to accumulate a minimum school lunch debt of \$500 dollars. Once the \$500 dollar threshold has been passed, schools would have to go through a state reimbursement and withholding process to attempt to recoup the money owed. The governor signed the bill into law and it is now Public Act 100-1092; effective August 26, 2018.

OTHER BILLS WITH RECENT GUBERNATORIAL ACTION

<u>HB 1262</u> (Currie, D-Chicago) requires mandate waiver requests regarding tax rates, funds, or transfers to be submitted to the full General Assembly for consideration. Governor total veto.

<u>HB 3792</u> (Lilly, D-Chicago) requires that students, beginning in sixth grade, be introduced to developing and applying work ethic in a variety of contexts. Governor total veto.

<u>H B 4208</u> (Welch, D-Westchester) pushes to reallocate funding from Student Resource Officer's (SROs) and law enforcement and use it for restorative justice, counselors, and psychologists. Governor amendatory veto.

- <u>HB 4284</u> (Chapa LaVia, D-Aurora) requires at least three members of the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) to be from the educator community, defined as a teacher, principal, superintendent, or school business official. Governor total veto.
- <u>HB 4514</u> (**Pritchard**, **R-Sycamore**) provides that only individuals licensed and endorsed as a school counselor may use the title of school counselor. Governor amendatory veto.
- <u>HB 4658</u> (Manley, D-Joliet) requires a school board to provide in-service training of licensed school personnel and administrators who work with children in kindergarten through grade 12 to identify the warning signs of mental illness and suicidal behavior in youth. Public Act 100-0903; effective January 1, 2019.
- HB 5195 (Greenwood, D-E. St. Louis) allows school boards to provide free transportation for any pupil residing within 1 1/2 miles from the school attended where conditions are such that walking, either to or from the school to which a pupil is assigned for attendance or to or from a pick-up point or bus stop, constitutes a serious hazard to the safety of the pupil due to a course or pattern of criminal activity. Governor amendatory veto, August 21, 2018.
- <u>HB 5247</u> (**Pritchard**) requires a rulemaking to allow high school students who are 16 years of age or older to participate in registered apprenticeship programs allowing them to earn postsecondary credit toward a certificate or degree. Public Act 100-992; effective August 20, 2018.
- <u>HB 5481</u> (**Guzzardi**, **D-Chicago**) requires school districts to report certain K-12 information about actively employed teachers, pupil-teacher ratios, class instructors, and class sections to ISBE. Governor Total Veto.
- <u>HB 5786</u> (Mayfield, D-Waukegan) requires in-school suspension programs for K-12 students to focus on promoting non-violent conflict resolution and positive interaction with other students and school personnel. Public Act 100-1035; effective August 22, 2018.
- <u>HB 5795</u> (**Chapa LaVia**) establishes a definition for truant students as a child who is subject to compulsory school attendance who is absent without valid cause for more than 1 percent but less than 5 percent of the past 180 days. Public Act 100-0918; effective August 17, 2018.
- <u>SB 454</u> (Fine, D-Glenview) provides that if a child's individualized education program team determines that the child does not require assistive technology services or devices, the team shall include a statement in the child's program that informs the child's parent or guardian of the decision and the basis for the decision. Public Act 100-0993; effective August 20, 2018.
- <u>SB 2344</u> (Mulroe, R-Chicago) allows a student to continue to receive special education services at a school outside of a district of residence even if the district of residence no longer has a joint agreement with district providing special education services. Governor total veto.
- <u>SB 2345</u> (**Lightford**, **D-Westchester**) requires ISBE to provide information for the school report card as to whether or not a school has participated in the Illinois Youth Survey. Governor total veto.
- SB 2350 (Morrison, D-Deerfield) states that the law enforcement drill must address an active shooter and must be done when students are present. School personnel and students would participate in the drill with law enforcement observing. Public Act 100-0996; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>SB 2654</u> (Hunter, D-Chicago) requires school boards to include information about influenza and influenza vaccinations when they provide information on school health issues to the parents or guardians. Public Act 100-0977; effective January 1, 2019.

SB 2838 (Link, D-Gurnee) provides that, by January 1, 2019, ISBE shall implement a program to allow school districts to supplement their substitute teacher recruitment for elementary and secondary schools with the use of recruiting firms. Public Act 100-1049; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>SB 2925</u> (**Lightford**) codifies the role of SRO's in schools, establishes a training process for SRO's, and requires any law enforcement agency providing SROs to schools must certify they have been trained beginning January 2021. Public Act 100-0984; effective January 1, 2019.

<u>SB 3220</u> (Aquino, D-Chicago) provides that an institution of higher education that is denied a recommendation for recognition by the State Educator Preparation and Licensure Board to offer an educator preparation program may appeal the decision to ISBE. Governor total veto, August 26, 2018.

RE: FY19 Budget Adoption

The tentative budget for the 2018/19 fiscal year was presented to the Board on June 6, 2018. A Public Hearing was held at the August 15, 2018 meeting. No changes were made to the budget prior to the August 15 public hearing.

The Board must adopt a balanced budget no later than September 30 of each year. The budget presented to the Board in June provided for expenditures in excess of revenues by \$4,799,465. This was due to capital project spending of \$8.84 million dollars. The budget being presented for adoption provides for expenditures in excess of revenues of \$3,896,995. The revised capital projects budget is \$7.39 million. A large portion of the Summer 2018 capital projects was charged to 2017/18 to account for work performed prior to June 30, in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures. The 2018/19 capital projects budget accounts for the remainder of the Summer 2018 projects and 35% of approximately \$6.68 million of Summer 2019 projects. These projects will be discussed at the Board Finance Committee meeting on September 12.

Each Board member will need to sign the attached state budget form following this Board meeting. Please note that the budget form does not include a list of vendor contracts in excess of \$1,000, as we are still compiling this data. The budget form, including the vendor contract page, will be submitted to the State by the September 30 deadline.

Administration will present an updated five-year forecast, including the results of the 2017/18 fiscal year, at the November Board of Education meeting. Attached is an updated budget along with a presentation discussing the major changes that were made since June.

RE: Action Item – Resolution Authorizing CCSD 15 Conveyance to City of Rolling Meadows

The City of Rolling Meadows has requested that the District transfer to them a small portion of land on the Willow Bend campus. The parcel of property is approximately 3,800 square feet, or 0.087 acres. The transfer must occur in order for the City to make improvements to the Barker Avenue bridge by the use of federal funding assistance.

Illinois law restricts the manner in which public school districts can transfer title of real estate to both public and private parties. The Illinois Local Government Property Transfer Act (50 ILCS 605/0.01 et seq.) governs the transfer of school district property to other governmental entities. Specifically, it requires the party acquiring the real estate (The City) to find and declare by resolution or ordinance, as appropriate, that it is necessary or convenient for the acquiring party to use, occupy or improve the real estate held by the other party. Upon the adoption of such resolution or ordinance, the property owner (The Board of Education) may transfer such real estate upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by both public bodies. Then, the property owner must approve the transfer of the property by a resolution passed by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the public body (The Board of Education) in favor of the property transfer. The resolution of the body transferring the property must be recorded in the office of the recorder where the property is located.

The Rolling Meadows City Council passed a resolution at its meeting on Tuesday, August 28, 2018. All documents related to this transfer of property have been reviewed or prepared by Hodges Loizzi.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF COMMUNITY CONSOLIDATED SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 15 AUTHORIZING THE TRANSFER OF REAL PROPERTY

WHEREAS, the Board of Education ("Board") of Community Consolidated School District No. 15, Cook County, Illinois ("School District") currently holds title to certain real property located at 3300 Algonquin Road, Rolling Meadows, Illinois 60008, further identified as Cook County PIN 08-08-122-018, which is legally described on Exhibit A hereto (the "Willow Bend Parcel"); and

WHEREAS, the City of Rolling Meadows ("City") desires to acquire the Willow Bend Parcel for use in its planned repair and reconstruction of the Barker Avenue Bridge over Salt Creek; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 2 of the *Local Government Property Transfer Act* (50 ILCS 605/2), the City declared by ordinance on August 28, 2018, that the Willow Bend Parcel is necessary for the City's use in the planned repair and reconstruction of the Barker Avenue Bridge; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined, pursuant to Section 5-22 of the *School Code* (105 ILCS 5/5-22), that the Willow Bend Parcel has become unnecessary, unsuitable and inconvenient for the uses of the School District; and

WHEREAS, the Board hereby determines, by two-thirds vote of its members, that it is in the best interests of the Board to transfer the Willow Bend Parcel to the City in accordance with Section 5-22 of the *School Code* (105 ILCS 5/5-22) and the *Local Government Property Transfer Act* (50 ILCS 605/0.01 et seq.).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Education of Community Consolidated School District No. 15, Cook County, Illinois as follows:

- **Section 1:** The Board hereby finds and declares that the Willow Bend Parcel is unnecessary, unsuitable, and inconvenient for the uses of the School District.
- Section 2: The Board has determined, by two-thirds vote of its members, that it is in the best interest of the Board to transfer title of the Willow Bend Parcel to the City, pursuant to the provisions of Section 5-22 of the *School Code* (105 ILCS 5/5-22) and the *Local Government Property Transfer Act* (50 ILCS 605/0.01 et seq.).
- Section 3: The Board President, Superintendent, and the Chief School Business Official are each hereby individually authorized to sign such documents on behalf of the Board as are necessary to complete the transfer of the Willow Bend Parcel.
- **Section 4:** This Resolution shall be in full force and effect forthwith upon its passage and any resolutions in conflict herewith are repealed.

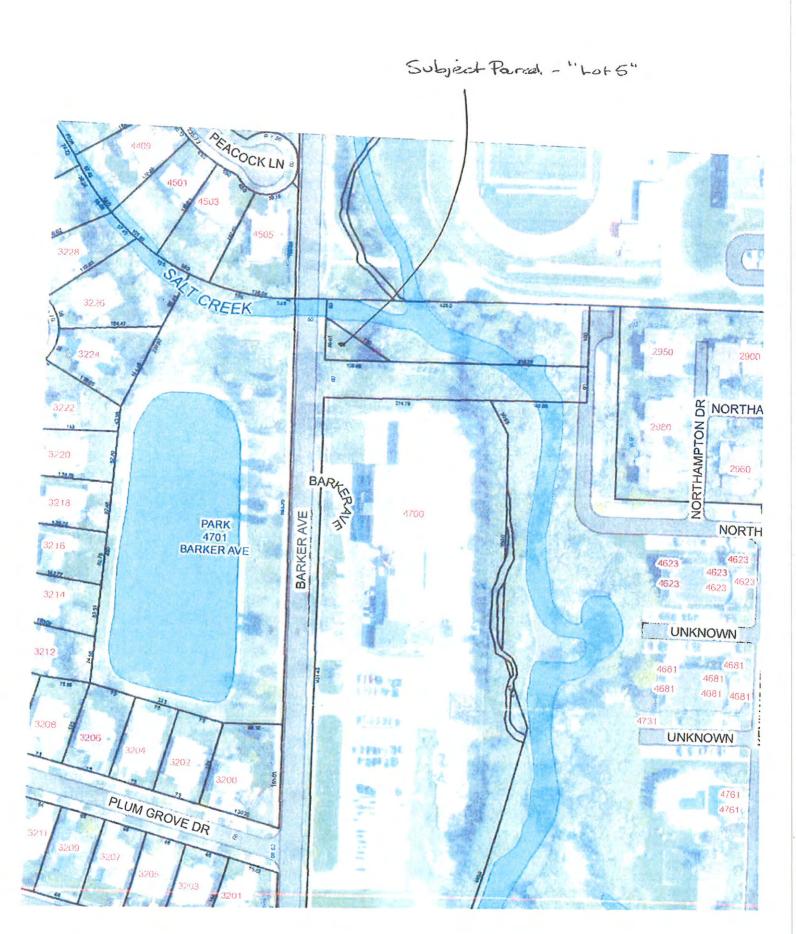

If during the Term hereof any person other than an employee or authorized representative of Telcom Innovations Group performs any maintenance or service work on the Equipment, then the obligations of Telcom Innovations Group hereunder shall immediately terminate.

For purposes of this Agreement, the term "Equipment" shall mean all new telecommunications equipment and cabling furnished directly to Customer by Telcom Innovations Group before the Effective Date or the Anniversary Date, if applicable. Unless otherwise specifically agreed upon by Telcom Innovations Group in writing, the term "Equipment" shall not include any pre-existing cabling, telephone(s), telephone connection equipment, paging equipment, data devices or other telecommunications equipment reused by Customer or otherwise not furnished by Telcom Innovations Group.

Maintenance does not include any services necessitated by, or of the type described in, any of the following:

Labor and material costs of additions, changes, relocations and removals: operating supplies and accessories; specification or engineering changes; Labor and material costs for replacement of those component parts subject to normal wear and tear as a result of use which do not affect the operational condition of the Equipment; Negligent, willful or intentional acts of Customer or any third party; Accident, casualty, neglect, misuse or any cause other than normal use in the manner intended by the parties hereto as described in the Equipment specifications; An act or event occurring external to the Equipment which causes, either directly or indirectly, a failure or malfunction in the Equipment, including without limitation, failures or malfunctions of the trunk or toll lines, cable or other equipment connecting the Equipment to the telecommunications system of the operating telephone utility or abnormal power fluctuations or failures which adversely affect the Equipment; Repair or maintenance or increase in normal service time resulting from Customer's failure to provide a suitable environment as required in the Equipment specifications or any other failure of the Customer to fully perform its responsibilities under this Agreement; Any other acts or events which may adversely affect the performance of the Equipment, occasioned by acts of the Customer or any third party, or the use by the Customer or any other third party of the Equipment in combination with any other apparatus, device of other system not supplied, or approved as to such combined use by Telcom Innovations Group, or the use by the Customer of any item of the Equipment in a manner not intended by the parties hereto or specified by Telcom Innovations Group.

2. TERM AND PAYMENT

The term of this Agreement shall commence as of the Effective Date and will cover a period of one year, unless a period other than one year is expressly stipulated in the space provided on the reverse side hereof. Payments due from the Customer to Telcom Innovations Group hereunder shall be made on or before the Effective Date of this Agreement. In the event payment is not made at said time, Customer will be billed for time and materials at Telcom Innovations Group' then current rates. On the Anniversary Date of this Agreement, any additional equipment to be covered will result in an increase of the maintenance service rates or other charges (Annual Charges) which are to be paid on or before the Anniversary Date.

This Agreement will automatically renew for an additional period of one (1) year on each Anniversary Date unless terminated by the parties. Either party may terminate this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, except that this Agreement shall immediately terminate upon notice from Telcom Innovations Group to Customer in the event that Customer shall fail to pay the Annual Charges hereunder.

3. TAXES

The Annual Charges incurred by Customer under this Agreement do not include any federal, state or local privilege, use, sales or excise taxes paid or payable by either Telcom Innovations Group or Customer with respect to this Agreement or any of the services performed or materials, equipment or other items provided by Telcom Innovations Group or Customer, except for taxes based on Telcom Innovations Group' net income on capital stock, which shall be borne by Telcom Innovations Group.

4. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

The Customer agrees that neither Telcom Innovations Group nor its subcontractor shall be liable for any loss or damage to the Equipment or other property or injury, or death to the Customer's agents, employees, or customers arising in connection with the maintenance services provided by Telcom Innovations Group or its subcontractor under this Agreement unless such loss, injury, death or damage results solely from the gross negligence or willful misconduct of Telcom Innovations Group officers, employees, or agents.

IN NO EVENT SHALL TELCOM INNOVATIONS GROUP OR ITS SUBCONTRACTOR BE LIABLE FOR ANY INDIRECT, INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL OR SPECIAL DAMAGES (INCLUDING, WITHOUT LIMITATION, ANY LOSS BY CUSTOMER OF BUSINESS, REVENUES OR GOODWILL), ARISING IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT OR EQUIPMENT.

5. FORCE MAJEURE

The timeliness of performance by Telcom Innovations Group of maintenance services hereunder or the performance of any other obligations of Telcom Innovations Group under this Agreement is in every case subject to delays caused by acts of God, war, riot, fire, explosion, accident, flood, sabotage, inability to obtain fuel or power, governmental laws, regulations or orders, acts or inaction of Customer, inability of Telcom Innovations Group subcontractors to perform, or any other cause beyond the reasonable control of Telcom Innovations Group, or labor trouble, strike, lockout or injunction (whether or not such labor event is within the reasonable control of Telcom Innovations Group). In the event of any such delay, the period of time for performance of services affected by such delay will be extended to reflect the effective delay occasioned thereby.

6. ASSIGNMENT

Telcom Innovations Group may assign, subcontract, transfer or otherwise dispose of, in whole or in part, any of its interests, rights or obligations under this Agreement including, without limitation, Telcom Innovations Group' obligation to provide maintenance services, provided that Telcom Innovations Group first gives adequate prior written notice thereof to the Customer. Customer shall not assign or subcontract any part or all of its interests hereunder except upon written consent of Telcom Innovations Group, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, and any attempted assignment or subcontracting without Telcom Innovations Group' prior written consent shall be null and void.

7. GOVERNING LAW

The parties hereto agree that this Agreement shall be governed and controlled by the laws of the State of Illinois, to the exclusion of the law of any other forum and without regard to the jurisdiction in which any action or proceeding may be instituted. Any part or parts of this Agreement, which is or are declared to be invalid, unenforceable, null and void, or unconstitutional, shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions thereof.

Re: Request for Proposals: Audio Visual Equipment

The District 15 Board of Education meetings have been videotaped and shared with the public since 2005. The existing camera system is about five years old and the existing audio system is about 20 years old. The cameras used in the boardroom are consumer-grade camcorders not intended for prolonged professional use. Both the video and audio systems are starting to fail and need to be replaced in order to continue providing this service to the public.

One of the goals set by the Communications Department in 2017 was the introduction of live-streamed Board of Education meetings. Providing the public with live, remote access to board meetings with higher-quality video and audio in place will provide a greater level of access and transparency to our community. The Technology and Communications Departments worked together to find a solution that would allow the failing equipment to be replaced with something that has high-definition audio and video, capable of live streaming to YouTube.

On August 10, 2018, the District requested proposals for the purchase of Audio & Visual Equipment and Installation. Six (6) vendors responded to the District's RFP #19-004 on August 30, 2018.

Waiver of Student Fees

The Superintendent will recommend to the School Board a schedule of fees, if any, to be charged students for the use of textbooks, consumable materials, extracurricular activities, and other school student fees. Students must also pay for the loss of or damage to school books or other school-owned materials.

Fees for textbooks, other instructional materials, and driver education are waived for students who meet the eligibility criteria for a fee waiver as described in this policy. In order that no student is denied educational services or academic credit due to the inability of parents/guardians to pay student fees, the Superintendent will recommend to the Board which additional fees, if any, the District will waive for students who meet the eligibility criteria for fee waiver. Students receiving a fee waiver are not exempt from charges for lost and damaged books, locks, materials, supplies, and equipment.

Notification

The Superintendent shall ensure that applications for fee waivers are widely available and distributed according to State law and Ill. State Board of Education (ISBE) rule and that provisions for assisting parents/guardians in completing the application are available.

Eligibility Criteria

A student shall be eligible for a fee waiver when the student currently lives in a household that meets the same income guidelines, with the same limits based on household size, that are used for the federal free meals program.

The Superintendent or designee will give additional consideration where one or more of the following factors are present:

- Illness in the family;
- Unusual expenses such as fire, flood, storm damage, etc.;
- Unemployment;
- Emergency situations;
- When one or more of the parents/guardians are involved in a work stoppage.

Verification

The Superintendent or designee shall establish a process for determining a student's eligibility for a waiver of fees in accordance with State law requirements. The Superintendent or designee may require family income verification at the time an individual applies for a fee waiver and anytime thereafter, but not more often than once every 60 calendar days. The Superintendent or designee shall not use any information from this or any independent verification process to determine free or reduced-price meal eligibility.

If a student receiving a fee waiver is found to be no longer eligible during the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify the student's parent/guardian and charge the student a prorated amount based upon the number of school days remaining in the school year.

Determination and Appeal

Within 30 calendar days after the receipt of a waiver request, the Superintendent or designee shall mail a notice to the parent/guardian whenever a waiver request is denied. The denial notice shall include: (1) the

reason for the denial, (2) the process and timelines for making an appeal, and (3) a statement that the parent/guardian may reapply for a waiver any time during the school year if circumstances change. If the denial is appealed, the District shall follow the procedures for the resolution of appeals as provided in the ISBE rule on waiver of fees.

Instruction

Education of Children with Disabilities

The School District shall provide a free appropriate public education in the least restrictive environment and necessary related services to all children with disabilities enrolled in the District, as required by the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and implementing provisions of the School Code, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and the Americans With Disabilities Act. The term *children with disabilities*, as used in this policy, means children between ages 3 and 21 (inclusive) for whom it is determined, through definitions and procedures described in the Ill. State Board of Education (ISBE) *Special Education* rules, that special education services are needed.

It is the intent of the District to ensure that students who are disabled within the definition of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 are identified, evaluated, and provided with appropriate educational services. Students may be disabled within the meaning of Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act even though they do not require services pursuant to the IDEA.

For students eligible for services under IDEA, the District shall follow procedures for identification, evaluation, placement, and delivery of services to children with disabilities provided in the ISBE *Special Education* rules. For those students who are not eligible for services under IDEA, but, because of disability as defined by Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, need or are believed to need special instruction or related services, the District shall establish and implement a system of procedural safeguards. The safeguards shall cover students' identification, evaluation, and educational placement. This system shall include notice, an opportunity for the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) to examine relevant records, an impartial hearing with opportunity for participation by the student's parent(s)/guardian(s), representation by counsel, and a review procedure.

The District may maintain membership in one or more cooperative associations of school districts that shall assist the District in fulfilling its obligations to the District's disabled students.

If necessary, students may also be placed in nonpublic special education programs or education facilities.

Instruction

Library Media Program

The Superintendent or designee shall manage the District's library media program to comply with (1) State law and Ill. State Board of Education (ISBE) rule and (2) the following standards:

- 1. The program includes an organized collection of resources available to students and staff to supplement classroom instruction, foster reading for pleasure, enhance information literacy, and support research, as appropriate to students of all abilities in the grade levels served.
- 2. Financial resources for the program's resources and supplies are allocated to meet students' needs.
- 3. Students in all grades served have equitable access to library media resources.
- 4. The advice of an individual who is qualified according to ISBE rule is sought regarding the overall direction of the program, including the selection and organization of materials, provision of instruction in information and technology literacy, and structuring the work of library paraprofessionals.
- 5. Staff members are invited to recommend additions to the collection.
- 6. Students may freely select resource center materials as well as receive guided selection of materials appropriate to specific, planned learning experiences.

Instruction

Field Trips

Field trips are permissible when the experiences are a part of the school curriculum and/or contribute to the District's educational objectives.

All field trips must have the Superintendent or designee's prior approval, except that field trips beyond a 200-mile radius of the school or extending overnight must have the prior approval of the School Board. The Superintendent or designee shall analyze the following factors to determine whether to approve a field trip: educational value, student safety, parent concerns, heightened security alerts, and liability concerns. On all field trips, a bus fee set by the Superintendent or designee may be charged to help defray the transportation costs.

Parents/guardians of students: (1) shall be given the opportunity to consent to their child's participation in any field trip; and (2) are responsible for all entrance fees, food, lodging, or other costs, except that the District will pay such costs for students who qualify for a fee waiver under Board policy 4:140, Waiver of Student Fees. All non-participating students shall be provided an alternative experience. Any field trip may be cancelled without notice due to an unforeseen event or condition.

Privately arranged trips, including those led by District staff members, shall not be represented as or construed to be sponsored by the District or school. The District does not provide liability protection for privately arranged trips and is not responsible for any damages arising from them.

Instruction

Community Resource Persons and Volunteers

The School Board encourages the use of resource persons and volunteers to: (1) increase students' educational attainment; (2) provide enrichment experiences for students; (3) increase the effective utilization of staff time and skills; (4) give more individual attention to students; and (5) promote greater community involvement.

Resource persons and volunteers may be used:

- 1. For non-teaching duties not requiring instructional judgment or evaluation of students;
- 2. For supervising study halls, long distance teaching reception areas used incident to instructional programs transmitted by electronic media (such as computers, video, and audio), detention and discipline areas, and school-sponsored extracurricular activities;
- 3. To assist with academic programs under a certificated teacher's immediate supervision;
- 4. To assist in times of violence or other traumatic incidents within the District by providing crisis intervention services to lessen the effects of emotional trauma on staff, students, and the community, provided the volunteer meets the qualifications established by the Ill. School Crisis Assistance Team Steering Committee;
- 5. As a guest lecturer or resource person under a certificated teacher's direction and with the administration's approval; or
- 6. As supervisors, chaperones, or sponsors for non-academic school activities.

The Superintendent shall follow Board policy 4:175, Convicted Child Sex Offender; Screening; Notifications, to establish procedures for securing and screening resource persons and volunteers. A person who is a sex offender, as defined by the Sex Offender Registration Act, or a violent offender against youth, as defined in the Murderer and Violent Offender Against Youth Registration Act, is prohibited from being a resource person or volunteer. All volunteer coaches must comply with the requirement to report hazing in policy 5:90, Abused and Neglected Child Reporting.

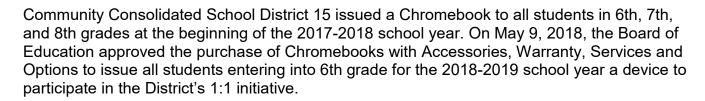

RE: Additional 1:1 Chromebook Purchase



Riverside Technologies, Inc., North Sioux City, SD, was awarded the RFP for the purchase of Chromebooks with Accessories, Warranty, Services and Options at the May 9, 2018 Board of Education meeting.

The District needs to purchase an additional sixty-one (61) Chromebooks because the enrollment projections used to create the order in May did not capture all students who would be participating in the 1:1 initiative this fall. More specifically, students entering into 5th grade gifted sections as well as students in self-contained special education sections were inadvertently excluded from the original order. Although this oversight represents an opportunity for improvement moving forward, all students who should be participating in the 1:1 initiative this year have been issued a Chromebook. This was accomplished by using all of the new Chromebooks that the District planned on keeping in inventory to temporarily loan students participating in the 1:1 program when break-fix issues arise as well as an earlier model of Chromebook that remains fully functional from students who are no longer in the District.

Riverside Technologies, Inc. has honored the same pricing for each item below that was provided to the district last May when the initial purchase was approved.

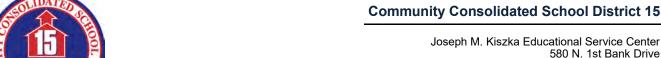

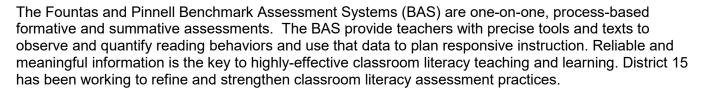

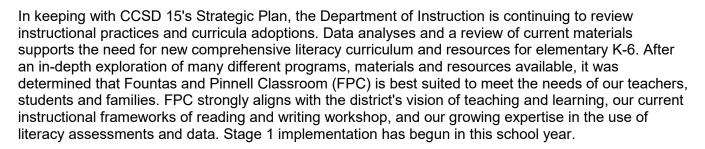
